







































































Finding Communities in Discord: Servers

FENTANYL: A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY


WHAT IS FENTANYL?

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 80 to 100 times stronger than morphine. While fentanyl is used to treat severe pain in clinical settings, it is also manufactured and distributed illegally.

WHY IS IT A PROBLEM?

Fentanyl is increasingly making its way into the street drug supply in Marin County.

Because of its potency and low cost, fentanyl is often mixed with other illicit drugs, increasing the likelihood of a fatal interaction. In California, overdose deaths from synthetic opioids like fentanyl were over five times higher in 2021 than in 2018 alone.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

Naloxone (brand name Narcan) is an opioid overdose reversal medication that is effective even against fentanyl poisoning. Having Narcan in your home or car can help you save the life of a friend, family member, or community member who is overdosing.

If you are a person who uses drugs, you can practice harm reduction tactics to decrease your chance of fatal overdose. However, the **only certain way** to avoid an overdose is to not use drugs. If you or someone you know wants to quit illicit opioids, **Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)** is available in Marin County. You can find a complete list of resources here.

HARM REDUCTION

IF I AM A PERSON WHO USES DRUGS, WHAT CAN I DO TO PREVENT FENTANYL OVERDOSE?

Testing for fentanyl in your drugs is a good first step, but testing alone will not ensure safety. Always assume risk of fentanyl poisoning when taking illicit substances.

YOU CAN REDUCE YOUR CHANCE OF OVERDOSE BY:

- 1. Using slow and using less
- 2. Snorting or smoking instead of injecting
- 3. Using in a group and staggering use
- 4. Always carrying naloxone (Narcan)

FENTANYL MYTHS: BUSTED!

CAN I OVERDOSE OR "GET HIGH" THROUGH PHYSICAL CONTACT WITH FENTANYL?

No, you cannot overdose via skin contact. Fentanyl must be introduced to the bloodstream or mucus membrane for an individual to feel the effects.

DOES NALOXONE WORK ON FENTANYL OVERDOSES?

Fentanyl is **not** resistant to naloxone (Narcan), but fentanyl overdoses can occasionally require multiple doses of Narcan. If you are a regular user, consider keeping several doses of Narcan nearby.




FENTANILO: UNA EMERGENCIA DE SALUD PUBLICA

¿QUÉ ES EL FENTANILO?

El fentanilo es un opioide sintético que es 80 a 100 veces más fuerte que la morfina. Aunque el fentanilo se utiliza para tratar el dolor intenso en entornos clínicos, también se fabrica y distribuye ilegalmente.

¿POR QUÉ ES UN PROBLEMA?

Fentanilo está haciendo cada vez más su camino hacia el suministro de drogas en la calle en el Condado de Marin. Debido a su potencia y bajo costo, el fentanilo a menudo se mezcla con otras drogas ilícitas, aumentando la probabilidad de una interacción fatal. En California, las muertes por sobredosis de opioides sintéticos como el fentanilo fueron más de cinco veces mayores en 2021 que en el 2018.

¿QUÉ PODEMOS HACER?

La naloxona (nombre de marca Narcan) es un medicamento de reversión para sobredosis de opioides que es eficaz incluso contra la intoxicación por fentanilo. Tener Narcan en su casa o en su coche puede ayudarle a salvar la vida de un amigo, miembro de la familia o miembro de la comunidad que tiene una sobredosis.

Si usted es una persona que usa drogas, puede practicar tácticas de reducción de daños para disminuir su probabilidad de sobredosis fatal.

Sin embargo, la única forma segura de evitar una sobredosis es no usar drogas. Si usted o alguien que conoce quiere dejar los opioides ilícitos, el **Tratamiento Asistido por Medicamentos (MAT)** está disponible en el Condado de Marin. Puede encontrar una lista completa de recursos <u>aquí</u>.

REDUCCIÓN DE DAÑOS

SI SOY UNA PERSONA QUE CONSUME DROGAS, ¿QUÉ PUEDO HACER PARA PREVENIR LA SOBREDOSIS DE FENTANILO?

Las pruebas de fentanilo en sus medicamentos son un buen primer paso, pero las pruebas por sí solas no garantizarán seguridad. Siempre asuma el riesgo de intoxicación por fentanilo al tomar sustancias ilícitas.

USTED PUEDE REDUCIR SU PROBABILIDAD DE SOBREDOSIS AL:

- 1. Usar de forma lenta y usar menos
- 2. Inhalar o fumar en lugar de inyectarse
- 3. Uso en grupo y uso asombroso
- 4. Siempre llevando naloxona (Narcan)

MITOS DE FENTANYL

¿PUEDO SUFRIR UNA SOBREDOSIS O "DROGARME" A TRAVÉS DEL CONTACTO FÍSICO CON FENTANILO?

No, no puede sufrir una sobredosis a través del contacto con la piel. El fentanilo debe introducirse en el torrente sanguíneo o en el moco membrana para que un individuo sienta los efectos.

¿LA NALOXONA FUNCIONA EN LAS-SOBREDOSIS DE FENTANILO?

El fentanilo no es resistente a la naloxona (Narcan), pero las sobredosis de fentanilo ocasionalmente pueden requerir dosis múltiples de Narcan. Si usted es un usuario habitual, considere mantener varias dosis de Narcan cerca.

SB 906: SCHOOL SAFETY BILL - 2023-2024 SY

Background:

The Drug Impairment Training for Educational Professionals (DITEP) program was developed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) as a result of the 2003 National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH). The survey was conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and indicated that an estimated 19.5 million Americans (8.2% of the population aged 12 or older) had used an illicit drug during the previous month. Drug abuse, whether it involves controlled substances or the misuse of prescription drugs, has permeated almost every level of society to some degree.

This training is intended to provide school administrators and nurses with a systematic approach to recognizing and evaluating individuals in the academic environment who are abusing and/or impaired by drugs, both legal and illegal, in order to provide early recognition and intervention. DITEP is derived from the national Drug Evaluation and Classification (DEC) Program, a successful law enforcement program used to detect drug and alcohol impaired drivers. The methods employed in this training are based on medical and scientific facts. The information is supported by research conducted in both laboratory and field studies. The DEC Program was validated in the laboratory by studies conducted at the Johns Hopkins University, and in the field by the Southern California Research Institute.

The training will enable attendees to determine first whether or not the individual is impaired. If it is determined that there is impairment, they will be able to determine whether the impairment is due to a medical problem or is drug related. And finally, if the impairment is drug related, attendees will be able to determine, through proven diagnostic procedures, what category or categories of drugs are likely causing the observed impairment.

DITEP training enables schools to employ an aggressive evaluation and detection program that will reduce drug usage, disruptions by drug-impaired individuals, and impaired driving in and around schools. This will make our

communities and schools safer places for all. There are two options for DITEP training, either an 8 or a 16 hour course. Both are broken down below.

Course Description:

Day One (or 8 hour only course) covers the following:

- · Drugs in Society
- · Policy, Procedures and Roles
- · Overview of Alcohol
- · Drug Identification, Categories and Their Effects
- . Contacting the Parents

Day one is geared toward administrators, teachers, nurses, counselors, school resource officers, security officers, and other staff who regularly interact with students.

Day Two (optional) covers the following:

- · Eye Examinations Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus
- · Lack of Convergence
- · Estimation of Pupil Size
- · Vital Signs
- · Divided Attention Testing Romberg Balance
- · Walk and Turn
- · One Leg Stand
- · Finger to Nose
- · Poly Drug Use
- · Assessment Procedures

Day two is geared toward nurses and other personnel who will have a more "hands-on" approach to evaluating a student's impairment. Principals and administrators are encouraged to attend to familiarize themselves with assessment procedures.

Pre-requisites:

In order to qualify for this course, prospective students must be currently employed at a school in a capacity that involves regular interaction with students.

Registration:

Upcoming classes may be found in the Schedule of Classes page under DITEP. In order to register for this course, students are required to electronically submit their full name, e-mail address, and school name to the course coordinator.

Fees & Costs:

There is no registration fee to attend this course. If a facility use fee is charged by the hosting agency, it will be noted in the expanded course description. This course is funded through the California Office of Traffic Safety DRE Grant. Travel reimbursement is not available for this course.
